

Recently I attended the Chico Gun Show to meet with constituents, listen to their views and discuss my position on issues affecting Second Amendment rights. I have long been a strong supporter of Americans' Constitutional right to own firearms and have worked to ensure that these rights are protected and enhanced.



During the 112th Congress I have continued my efforts by supporting six bills that protect Second Amendment rights – including legislation that would allow people with concealed carry permits to carry a concealed firearm in other states ([H.R. 822](#)) and legislation that would reform the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives ([H.R. 1093](#)).

I have included a complete list of the bills I have cosponsored below. If you have any questions, or would like further details on any of them, please don't hesitate to contact me. I will always work to protect and enhance the rights of law abiding gun owners across our nation.

1. National Right to Carry Reciprocity Act – [H.R. 822](#) would allow any person with a valid concealed carry permit to carry a concealed firearm in any state that issues concealed firearm permits, or that does not prohibit the carrying of concealed firearms.

2. BATFE Reform and Firearms Modernization Act – [H.R. 1093](#) would reform BATFE, limiting their ability to unnecessarily restrict access to firearms, and codify longstanding congressional policies in the firearms arena.

3. Second Amendment Enforcement Act – [H.R. 645](#) would eliminate harsh gun control laws imposed by the District of Columbia after the Supreme Court's decision in *D.C. v Heller* (2008).

4. Firearms Interstate Commerce Reform Act – [H.R. 58](#) would remove several antiquated and unnecessary restrictions imposed on interstate firearms businesses since 1968.

5. Veterans' Heritage Firearms Act – [H.R. 420](#) would provide a 90-day amnesty period during which veterans and their family members could register firearms acquired overseas between June 26, 1934, and October 31, 1968, without fear of prosecution.

6. Collectable Firearms Protection Act – [H.R. 615](#) would prevent the State Department from interfering with the legal importation of surplus collectable M1 rifles from South Korea that were originally made in the United States.
